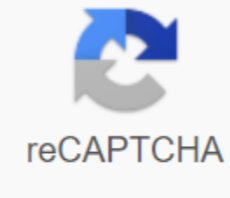

Background Introduction This site will help you expand your academic vocabulary using the Academic Dictionary (AWL). All students, home students and overseas students, need to learn the technical vocabulary of their area. As students in English prepare for academic studies, you must also learn general academic vocabulary, words such as: function, illustrate, regulate, strategy. This central academic vocabulary is used by authors in many different subject areas. Learning vocabulary from AWL will help you improve your understanding of academic texts. It will also help you write assignments in an academic style. Of course, basic vocabulary in English is also important for academic students. To check if you know this basic vocabulary, look at Word Lists. How can you use AWL? You can try learning a few words from the list every day, but it is better to study the words in context, so that you understand how they are used. To quickly and easily identify words from AWL in text, use AWL Highlighter. This program will display the academic words in bold. For example: Data were collected by the International Labour Office on hourly wages in fifty different occupations, and on consumer prices for a sample of household goods in around 100 countries. After analysis, it turned out that the value of one hour's work, in terms of purchasing power, varied considerably from one country to another. You can use AWL Gapmaker to create tests for yourself. This program will replace words from AWL with a gap. Try to fill the gaps, then check your work using the selected text. In this way, you can expand your core academic vocabulary. Background The AWL was created by Avelin Coxhead in New Zealand. To see the complete AWL look at the Coxhead website. To create AWL, Coxhead made first and foremost a corpus i.e. a computerized collection, with over 400 written academic texts, representing about 3.5 million words in total. Coxhead used a variety of types of texts: journal articles, www articles and university textbooks, covering 28 different subject areas from 4 disciplines: art, commerce, law and science. She counted how often and how widely different words were used. She then chose the central academic vocabulary. She only addressed the words that were at least 100 times in corpus as a whole and at least ten times in each of the four disciplines. A word that was often found in legal texts but rarely in, for example, science texts was not included. As a result, the 570 words on the Academic Word List are valuable to all students preparing for academic studies, regardless of whether they plan to follow a course in medicine, architecture or Law. If you plan to continue your studies in English, this list will help you. The words are divided into 10 sub-lists by frequency.
